Province Dialogue: “Professionalism of the PCL”



On May 14, 2014, a very interesting and fruitful discussion took place with eight diocesan catechetical leaders and the WDREF Board. The subject of this annual province dialogue was “Professionalism of the PCL (parish catechetical leader).”

Present from the diocesan offices were Gary Pokorny (Milwaukee), Peggy Schoenfuss (Superior), Dr. Joe Bound and Sr. Jackie Spaniola (Green Bay), and Michelle Nilsson and Lindsay Becher (Madison). Joining us from the diocesan offices via the Internet were Ann Lankford (LaCrosse) and Patrick Delaney (Madison).

The first question was a simple one: Using 1-3 words, describe what a PCL looks like. Responses included: Good communicator, patient, holy, do-er, creative, motivated, organized, Christ-centered, witness, active listener, committed prayer life, pastoral, loving, joyful, reflects Jesus, compassionate, persevering, excited, functions without sleep, welcoming servant, thinking with the church, respectful, humble, teacher, lifelong learner, sincere and connected.

We recognized that the background and education of PCLs varies widely. While some PCLs have BAs or MAs, there are many dedicated, faithful PCLs who don't have formal training or education.

Many resources are currently available to support PCLs in their efforts to develop as professionals. These include: Diocesan workshops and program days (both educational and networking), local PCL organization meeting days (both educational and networking), college and university courses, WYRE ministries, guest speakers, SOWDI in Madison, Code of Ethical Standards, spiritual direction, current books, NCCL's Catechetical Leader magazine, retreat centers, USCCB online materials, certification programs, YouTube, mentoring programs, WDREF, cultivation ministries, national organizations (such as NCCL, NFYCM, FCH, NCPD), gifts and talents of parishioners, learning from those we minister to and with, staff orientations and district meetings.

When people were asked to note which of the current resources are most helpful to PCLs, the top responses were:

1. Local PCL Organization meetings and networking
2. Certification programs
3. Staff orientations
4. Mentoring programs
5. Current books and literature such as NCCL's Catechetical Leader magazine
6. Diocesan workshops

PROVINCE DIALOGUE: “PROFESSIONALISM OF THE PCL” *...continued*

One of the difficulties in participating in these opportunities is that pastors and Pastoral Council members might not believe that a level of professionalism is necessary. Too often, educated, fulltime PCLs are let go and replaced by part-time people with no background. There isn't the expectation that part-time PCLs should also be professional. But, everyone should be growing in their professionalism from the beginning of their service, even those who are not paid for the ministry they are doing. Let's stop calling people “just a volunteer” when they are performing a professional role. Even pastors who seem supportive of professionalism in this ministry are often so conscious of the costs that finances form the basis for their decisions.

If we want the ministry of the PCL to be seen as a professional vocation, PCLs also need to treat it as such. PCLs need to dress, act and talk like professionals.

After describing the current situation, the discussion turned to the future: Are there concrete opportunities for WDREF, the Local PCL Organizations and dioceses to work together in new or more intentional ways to advance professionalism among the PCL ministry? Four ideas surfaced:

1. Priests and parishes need to hear that PCLs are professionals. Make it an expectation that priests and PCLs meet monthly to share thoughts, ministerial developments, vision, etc. Ann Lankford is working on the creation of an agenda for this type of meeting in her diocese.
2. Create a checklist/evaluation to send to parish councils asking them to review their catechetical formation in the parish. Share a description of a good PCL from a credible source. Questions on the checklist should show what it takes to be a good PCL, e.g. attends professional meetings, etc.

3. Meet together with priests on the subject of professionalism of the PCL, include expectations, resources, etc. Ask some priests/deacons who already view this as a professional ministry to assist with talking points and Q&A.
4. Hold regional meetings where primary needs and concerns could be conveyed to the Bishop. PCLs could put their concerns in writing. DCLs could bring those concerns to the Bishop and then give his feedback on the items, advocating for the voice of the PCL.

As these four ideas were discussed, the group gravitated towards the second one because we can move forward on this item without having to engage other groups at this initial stage. U.S. Catholic magazine recently had checklists for parishes which we could review. Sr. Jacki commented that she already has a request for a checklist like this.

We are not trying to create an evaluation tool for PCLs. The checklist would indicate what is needed from the parish to create and support the position of a professional catechetical leader. For example: Do you pay for the PCL to attend workshops and professional meetings geared towards the education/formation of the PCL? In responding to the items on the checklist, parishes would be analyzing their current situations and learning what they are doing well and what needs improvement.

We should consider making a video on the day-in-the-life of a PCL to show what the position entails. The video could include interviews with PCLs, pastors, etc. A team of four will meet to develop a draft of this plan. Each diocese and local PCL organization will review the plan and offer input. While most items in the checklist would be universal, there could also be small sections with items unique to a particular diocese, e.g. Green Bay has specific requirements related to textbook selection. We look forward to the development of this tool for parishes.

Who's Who Moment ...

WDREF Members in the Spotlight

With the unexpected events of this summer, we decided it was time to highlight WDREF, itself, in the Who's Who. Why WDREF? Here are the reasons, from present to past:

- The unexpected death of Lee Nagel, former diocesan director of Total Catholic Education in Green Bay, left a void in many people's lives. It left an especially large void in NCCL (National Conference for Catechetical Leadership) where Lee had served as Executive Director for the past 7 years. In an emergency meeting, NCCL's Board of Directors discussed how to keep the organization moving forward in the days/weeks/months ahead until a new Executive Director could be hired. Many names were discussed as possible Interim Administrators. The Board appointed Joanie McKeown as Interim Administrator of NCCL's internal operations. (President Bill Miller was tasked with handling NCCL's liaison relationships with other organizations.)
- Joanie McKeown had previously been elected to two terms on NCCL's Board of Directors. She was (and is) serving as NCCL's Treasurer and CFO as she took on most of the responsibilities of NCCL's Executive Director. And, Joanie is a product of WDREF! She has participated in almost every WDREF Conference for the last 20 years, served on WDREF's Board and various committees, and helped to write and publish WDREF's two books, "Employing Parish Catechetical Leaders" and "Best Practices in Catechesis on the Sacra-

ments." "WDREF has been an important part of my life since the early 1990s," said Joanie. "The professional and ministerial information and networking with my peers from across the state have been important in the development of my skills. If it wasn't for WDREF, I could not have stepped into the leadership position at NCCL after Lee's death."

- Mike Westenberg, WDREF member and PCL (parish catechetical leader) in the Diocese of Green Bay, also had a high-profile position in NCCL. In May, he completed his second term on NCCL's Board of Directors. So, of the 9 elected Board members from across the United States, made up of diocesan directors, diocesan staff, PCLs, and university academics, PCLs who were WDREF members (Mike and Joanie) filled two of the nine seats for the last 5 years. Quite an accomplishment considering the thousands of people who could have been elected.
- Pam Fischer, also a WDREF member and PCL in the Diocese of Green Bay, serves as the PCL rep from Wisconsin on NCCL's Representative Council. Her voice is especially important because only 12 provinces have PCL representation. Her voice from WDREF represents our PCL ministry in a broader way than just being a Wisconsin voice.
- Pam serves in a long line of PCL reps to NCCL. When NCCL's Representative Council was formed over 25 years ago, WDREF was the first to send a province rep. to serve on the Council, giving

WDREF a voice at the table on the national scene and influencing the national agenda for professional catechetical ministry.

- WDREF's two publications, mentioned earlier, are sold nationally by NCCL, a sign of the quality of these products, which are serving the broader catechetical ministry beyond the boundaries of our state.
- Through WDREF's annual dialogue with the diocesan catechetical leaders, WDREF provided input on national publications by the USCCB, including, the "National Directory for Catechesis" and "Our Hearts Were Burning Among Us."
- Formed in the 1980s, WDREF was the first province or statewide organization in the country for parish directors/coordinators of religious education.
- WDREF was created with the help of the diocesan directors/staff of each of the five dioceses in Wisconsin. The diocesan members recognized the value of having PCLs from across the state come together to share ministry ideas, to hear and discuss new concepts and methodologies, and to offer support to each other in our ministries.
- The list of diocesan supporters of WDREF is too long to include, but continues to the present day.
- We congratulate WDREF for its role on the local, province and national scenes!

First and foremost, the organization has lost a great man... Lee Nagel. Lee died on May 26, a few short days after the annual conference. The organization is in the process of hiring a new executive director.

The 79th Annual NCCL Conference will be held in Buffalo, NY May 17-21, 2015. Speakers include Bishop Richard Malone, Br. Mickey McGrath and Jerry Galipeau. The theme of the conference is Encounter the Joy of the Gospel. For the most up-to-date information visit www.nccl.us.



Highlights from the May 2014 National Conference

- Sherry Weddell was a keynote speaker who discussed Energizing the Church. One key way to do that is to form intentional disciples. She focused on how we need to take risks for Christ. We have to adapt our ministry to where the people are...we need to remind our communities to reach for the stars...their faith.
- Jared Dees was the speaker at the PLC forum and he shared that we need to be disciples, servants, teachers and leaders as catechetical leaders. It is our mission to evangelize our communities. We need to be witnesses to our students. Pass on our faith!

- The last two speakers, Mary Birmingham and Dorothy Mensah-Aggrey reminded us that we are the models and to never lose sight of what we are truly here to do... serve the Lord. We need to be bold and courageous. It is a way of life.
